Content Development for Newborn Screening Clearinghouse

NICHQ is managing all content for a new comprehensive web-based clearinghouse

to raise awareness about the importance of newborn screening and help families navigate the screening process. In partnership with content expert Genetic Alliance, NICHQ is facilitating the development of up-to-date and state-specific web-content about newborn screening and its life-saving potential.

Funded by the Health Resources and Services Administration Maternal and Child Health Bureau.

National Action Partnership to Promote Safe Sleep Improvement and Innovation Network

This national effort aims to increase infant caregiver adoption of safe infant sleep practices as recommended by the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP), as well as breastfeeding, by empowering champions for these protective behaviors within systems that serve families at risk. Funded by the Health Resources and Services Administration Maternal and Child Health Bureau.

National Network of Perinatal Quality Collaboratives

During this five-year initiative, NICHQ serves as the coordinating center and provides expertise to 43 state-based perinatal quality collaboratives with the goal of deepening and accelerating improvement efforts for maternal and infant health outcomes. Funded by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

New York State Maternal and Child Health Collaboratives

NICHQ is supporting the New York State Department of Health's (NYSDOH) New York State Perinatal Quality Collaborative (NYSPQC) in their efforts to provide the best, safest and most equitable care to people in the perinatal period and their infants. This is achieved through the development and implementation of promising interventions in New York State birthing facilities. Funded by the NYSDOH.

New York State Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) in Pregnancy & Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome (NAS) Project

NICHQ is supporting the NYSPQC's work with birthing facilities to improve the identification and management of the care of pregnant people with OUD, and to improve the identification, standardization of therapy and coordination of aftercare of infants with NAS.

New York State Birth Equity Improvement Project

NICHQ is supporting the NYSPQC in their empowerment of birthing facilities to: identify how individual and systemic racism impacts birth outcomes at their organizations; and take action to improve both the experience of care and perinatal outcomes for Black birthing people in the communities they serve.

Quality Improvement Community of Learning

In partnership with the American College of Obstetricians Gynecologist's

Alliance for Innovation on Maternal Health (AIM), NICHQ has developed a Quality Improvement Community of Learning (COL) to strengthen and support knowledge and understanding of Quality Improvement (QI) methodology. The Community of Learning will cover topics related to The Model for Improvement, PDSA cycles, using data for improvement, spreading improvement, and sustainability. Additionally, participants will hear from states and entities that have had success with using QI to implement four core AIM patient safety bundles: Obstetric Hemorrhage, Severe Hypertension in Pregnancy, Care for Pregnant and Postpartum People with Substance Use Disorder, and Cardiac Conditions in Obstetrical Care.

Supporting Healthy Start Performance Project

NICHQ, in partnership with the National Healthy Start Association, is providing a comprehensive capacity-building assistance training program for 101 Healthy Start programs nationwide. The training program includes technical assistance on high-priority topics, such as safe sleep, fatherhood and breastfeeding, and training for program staff on core competencies. Funded by the Health Resources and Services Administration Maternal and Child Health Bureau.

Environmental Influences on Child Health Outcomes: Developmental Impact of NICU Exposures

In support of studying the long-term effects of environmental exposures on children who are treated in neonatal intensive care units, NICHQ provides project management and data management and analysis for participating clinical sites. Funded by the National Institutes of Health via the Children's Hospital at Montefiore/Albert Einstein College of Medicine and the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai.

Florida Children's Medical Services Learning and Action Network

By building the quality improvement capacity of specialty programs, this learning and action network will grow and support a high-quality system of care in Florida that serves all children and youth with special health care needs, regardless of insurance status and location. Funded by Florida Department of Health.

Hemoglobinopathies National Coordinating Center

NICHQ, with partner organization Abt Associates, is supporting a Hemoglobinopathies National Coordinating Center (HNCC) to help sickle cell disease (SCD) treatment demonstration program grantees – including community and federally qualified health centers – address structural and systemic barriers in their regions and implement evidence-based SCD care. The NICHQ and Abt Associates team are collaborating with organizations such as the Sickle Cell Disease Association of America to improve the quality of – and access to – care for SCD. Funded by the Health Resources and Services Administration Maternal and Child Health Bureau.
